Title: Audiological State Licensure Boards: Laws, Compositions, and Protections

Course Description: The field of audiology is a young healthcare professional that has only been in existence for seventy-five years. The field of audiology has developed from a profession of individuals holding degrees in otology, speech pathology, psychology and other disciplines to a field of individuals holding a doctoral degree in audiology. The profession has evolved greatly since its origin. "Services such as otoscopic examination, now considered to be routine for audiologists, were considered unnecessary in the infancy of the profession" (Messersmith et al. 2014). As information, knowledge, and technology advanced, the audiologic scope of practice increased. However, it is unclear that current state licensure standards are reflective of the current state of the audiologic practices. The purpose of this study is to do the following: 1) collect data regarding how audiologists in different states obtain licensure; 2) discover the professional composition of licensure boards and see what commonalities and differences there are among states; 3) analyze significant commonalities and differences in licensure requirements; 4) determine if there are significant demographic, economic or geographic differences among state licensure criteria, 5) and promote advocacy for audiologists
